We have been learning to devise. We have been able to explore a variety of stimuli to do this. During these lessons I have developed my social skills and worked effectively as a team. This has been a great opportunity to make friendships within the class and forge strong working relationships. We have experimented with props, experimenting with different ideas to develop our creativity and self-expression through drama. We have also been studying theatre practitioners as a starting point for our component 1 examinations in the summer term. I have enjoyed looking at the German practitioner, poet and playwright Bertolt Brecht, alongside the British born Emma Rice.

Brecht's epic theatre aims to alienate the audience and allow them to focus on the message of the play. Rice's technique of transposing; taking the text and putting in a contemporary setting has proved to be both challenging and interesting. The focus on creating our own original work this term has opened up our eyes to a range of styles and approaches that we can utilize.

'Everybody's Talking About Jamie'

Year 11 saw a production of 'Everybody's Talking About Jamie at the Birmingham Hippodrome for their component 3 live theatre examination. The students really engaged with the production and its messages about individuality and acceptance. It was great to see the emotional response of some students and once again highlighted the power the arts can have to impact our everyday lives.

Going to see 'Everybody's Talking about Jamie' elaborated my skills as a drama student. The powerful lighting and marvellous songs overpowered the audience. The projection of the pre-recorded video of the new character 'Mimi Me' was one of the moments of the show that I will never forget. Also, the idea of using one piece of set to create different atmospheres in different scenes was fascinating. In the musical, they used a simple school desk to create this effect. Toxicology Trip

There will
