Trips



Triumph for the Rights Respecting Team!

What a successful year it has been for the Unicef Rights Respecting ambassadors. Back in September the team managed to finalise a school charter, that was displayed in all classrooms. In December, final preparations were made for our accreditation meeting, which resulted in LSG being given the Silver Rights Aware award for our achievements in promoting the rights according to the UnitedNations

Convention on the Rights of Child. This is a universally agreed set of non-negotiable standards and obligations to protect the rights of children around the world. In total, 190 countries help every child to survive and flourish including the UK.

Our aim has been to share further knowledge and understanding of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child through assemblies, events, and resources for PSHCE lessons. More recently, the rights team have coordinated a soccer aid event to raise money for Unicef where staff and sixth form students battled it out to win the match much to the delight of the spectators.





The next step is to achieve the gold award and in September new students will be invited to join the team so that we can make plans to continue to develop knowledge and understanding of the UNCRC. Going for GOLD,


MATHS

The maths department is very proud of the way our year 11 students have approached their exams, we have every confidence that their hard work will pay off and I look forward to seeing them all on results day in August.

Our year 10s deserve a well done too for all of their hard work in maths this year. An excellent way for the students to continue this hard work outside of school and over the summer break is to log in to their MethodMaths.com or MathsWatch.com accounts – both brilliant ways to practise questions and take an independent approach to revision.

I would also like to say well done and congratulations to the 41 students in years 7 and 8 who took part in the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge this year. 14 students received a bronze certificate from the UKMT in recognition of achievement in this national competition. I would also like to give a special mention to the following students who received a silver or gold

certificate: Izzy, Laaibah, Aiela, Dora and Lesley in year 7 and Mya and Ivalyn in year 8.





Last Tuesday three of our y9 students attended the maths picnic competition at Oldbury Academy. The girls did exceptionally well on all the four rounds of the competition, scoring full marks on the first three rounds and they only lost one mark in the fourth round.

I am so excited to say that they came joint first with another school. Each round had a time limit of 20 mins. In round one the students had to solve a cross number puzzle. Round two tested their shape and space abilities, whilst they also had to retrieve their knowledge of fractions and percentages!

Pastry Puzzle Marking was probably our favourite round. Some clues on 2D shapes were handed out to the students and the girls had to place the shapes in the correct grid. We did a quick recap on the properties of quadrilaterals and their diagonals and what regular shapes meant. Round four was enjoyable too - multiple choice questions on comparing pairs. The one question which the students were not sure about was comparing the mass of table tennis balls and tennis balls! In the end the final scores were close. Luckily KEVI LSG had kept some working out on the ratio and Venn diagram question and managed to get some extra points in the tie break question.

All three girls showed excellent teamwork skills. They were fast, supportive of each other and celebrated each other's successes. Whilst we are all proud of their achievement in the competition, we were particularly moved by their humility and grace.

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES AT LORDSWOOD

King Edwards VI EDI student committee

The termly EDI student committee took place at Camp Hill School for Girls on Wednesday 21st June and the five EDI Lordswood representatives attended.

Ms Khan and Miss Bréchon-Smith - The Foundation EDI leads provided an update on the EDI work that is taking place across the Trust:-

- A recent staff survey revealed staff now feel more empowered to tackle EDI and this has been down to the Foundation work promoting EDI.
- The EDI Foundation Staff network Group began a month and a half ago which invited staff across 13 schools from the LGBTQ+ community to get together and share experiences.
- The Foundation will be applying a greater focus on Wellbeing over the coming years. A Student wellbeing ambassador will promote wellbeing across schools as well as working with other wellbeing ambassadors.
- Schools are part of the Equally safe schools training with Equaliteach to help tackle identity based bullying in schools. Surveys will go out next Spring to see what progress has been made and impact for staff and governors.
- A Curriculum audit to determine how inclusive certain subjects are has taken place. This audit will have every department providing a rating on what they are doing, and any support needed for students.
- Monitoring of EDI policy in schools to continue.

The main purpose of the meeting was to allow the EDI student representatives to discuss EDI issues that affect young people and how to raise awareness of these issues across all the schools.

Misha I 10W, Lordswood 's EDI student representative, explains what happened.

"The EDI committees from our school went to Camp Hill School for Girls on Wednesday 21st June, where we spoke with EDI representatives from other schools in the King Edward Foundation about a variety of topics and discussed ways to convey our EDI message through working collaboratively on projects.

We are currently working with Camp Hill and Northfield School to create an assembly resource that can

be used for International Women's day next year. We talked about why gender equality is important, why it should be a frequent topic of discussion, and what we can do to create a society that is more equitable. The other school EDI representatives are also working on developing EDI resources that will be shared for use across all the schools in the Trust. There will be a film about the day in the life of a neurodiverse person and presentation about different cultures that can be shown in school. Additionally, we also addressed problems within the school community involving school policies, the environment and representation. Overall, every one of us had a great time sharing our thoughts and opinions with various individuals, and it was a great opportunity to have our voices heard regarding issues that were raised"



PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES AT LORDSWOOD

The students were asked if there were any areas of focus they would like to see in the EDI Student meetings next year. The responses included:

- A newsletter centring around EDI sent out across the Foundation.
- A continuation of the once a term structure of meetings Autumn (face to face), Spring (Online) and Summer (face to face).
- Schools to look at school uniform policies (FLEs confirmed this is already happening).
- Addressing language barriers through a newsletter translated into different languages which can also be sent to Parents.
- For schools to think about their colour contrast ratios on their website making it more accessible.
- Pupils who are about to leave school to be educated on Workplace rights ahead of entering employment.

I was able to make connections and relationships with the children and was also able to find a more nurturing and caring side to me through the work experience. It also was a nice surprise to see how diverse and talented all of the children i worked with were and i would love to re-do my work experience there again as even though it was challenging i found myself in a happier mood each day after working with the kids and getting to go back and see them the next day."

My work experience consisted of working at Preet Gill's office in which I partook in a range of activities such as looking through petitions sent by constituents, policy, and drafting emails for casework. One of my favourite things I did would have to be examining casework. There were roughly three that I worked on where I had to read and understand the issues, then I had to draft emails to the council, constituents, or even governmental departments. Additionally, opening petitions came in second place as I was able to look through a variety of different issues that people were petitioning for which really made me gain an insight on which issues were dominating at the time. I found work to be really exciting as my colleagues were really warm and friendly which made my time there 100 times better than it already was! There was also almost always a new issue that would appear which I would find extremely interesting to look into. Overall, it was a unique experience as I got to develop more of an understanding of what issues people were most passionate about and how demanding the job of an MP is!!!

During my work experience at Sandwell hospital, I shadowed different nurses, doctors and clinics doing daily runs and appointments on the paediatric wards. I learnt that there are many different doctors and was able to watch them work and ask questions. I watched in on consultations and joined ward rounds which is basically checking the progress of the patients. Doing this made me understand the kind of work that the staff have to do every day and adapt their own personal time based on their patients like having to finish their rounds before having lunch which could sometimes go up to 3-4pm. Some days it was upsetting seeing some children in pain but it gave me a reason to go back and check in on their health and when they got discharged it felt good. Everyday was different and I was able to join different doctors daily and get advice in addition to watching blood test scanning and testing. Seeing this made me realise that it's a very hands on job and you need to be able to improvise and have good problem solving skills because anything can go wrong or change at any time so you need to be prepared. During the week it was junior doctor strike week but I was lucky enough to talk to different university students and doctors about their work and how they are finding it as well as what course I am planning on doing to get to my goal which is to be a paediatric nurse and after this week I am pretty sure it is the job for me. I did my work experience at Vision Express in Harborne. During my time, I was shown five different eye scans, including a pressure test, an OCT scan and a visual field test. My favourite part was sitting in on the eye examinations, where I was able to see a range of people with different vision. Year 12 CIPFA challenge

A team of seven Year 12 Sixth Form Business students took part in CIPFA (The Chartered Institute of Public Finance and Accounting) 6th Form Management Game at The University of Birmingham on Wednesday 28th June 2023. Students were competing against other post 16 students, in a stimulating and fun environment to sample the scope, complexity and impact of financial management in the public sector. The game took a full day and is an excellent introduction to the world of work and a way of developing and strengthening teamwork, leadership, management and organisational skills. The team from King Edward VI Lordswood School for Girls competed against 5 other teams and were a credit to themselves and the school, and should all be proud of their achievements during a pressured day as the senior management team of an NHS Hospital Trust. The team were asked to grapple with challenges including a large funding gap, service modernisation and efficiency, a workforce struggling with cost of living increases, negative social media rumours and the distrust between neighbouring communities. There were meetings with the local MP and a trades union official, reports to write, new issues arising during the day and responses to be made on social media. All our students showed a wide variety of skills, with efficient team-working being at the very core. In particular Tiffany To was recognised for "keeping everyone in the team to time and bringing together the individual contributions of the team" into a cohesive whole team presentation and report under pressure, which is not easy. She was awarded a £15 Amazon voucher by the event organisers and volunteers that were supporting. Well done Tiffany! Mrs Mann

Myself and 6 other students were lucky enough to get the opportunity to compete in the CIPFA games - a competition where different sixth forms compete in groups of 7 to try and solve problems given to your team throughout the day that a person working within the public sector would face to the best of our ability. The main task that all teams were given was to raise around £19 million for the NHS through methods such as removing funding for organisations to help save money yet also had to take into account the consequences of these choices. I was given the role of Chief Executive and my role was to oversee the rest of the team, delegate tasks to each member and ensure we were hitting deadlines. This high pressure environment of having to meet such short deadlines and having problem after problem arise was difficult but also incredibly rewarding. It helped all 7 of us understand how we work under high pressure environments and also improved our problem solving skills by having to find quick and efficient solutions to solving issues given to us. What I had also noticed was that the experience helped our teamwork skills, the issues that were given to us were difficult issues to draw conclusions to and most of the time required two or more members of the team to have to work together, so because of that, all 7 of us had no problem helping another member solve a problem or work on an email in order to effectively solve the problems and meet any urgent deadlines. Finally, I would say that the experience also helped in my understanding of what a day of working within the public sector would be like and whether or not I would enjoy working within that type of environment. Before participating in the CIPFA games, I had never considered working within the public sector however through this experience it had made me aware that I did really enjoy some aspects of it such as working within a team, working under pressure and always having something new to work on. So overall I would say that the CIPFA games was an incredibly positive experience because of the skills it helped me improve on like teamwork and problem solving, but also the insight into the public sector and what it is like to work within the public sector.
