

Rights Respecting School

The Rights Respecting Team have worked very hard to ensure that the rights of children are at the forefront of life at Lordswood School for Girls.

As a Silver Rights Aware School we pride ourselves on promoting the rights of the child according to the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child. Our aim is to achieve the Gold award next year further ensuring that our students are aware of the 54 rights stated in the convention. The team is made up of students from all year groups: Esme , Ella , Ivalyn , Jessica, Romessa, Maysonn , Liyna , Sarah, Seren , Farwah B and Aleezay are our current ambassadors, who have had a successful year educating our students on the rights of children in the UK around the world.

What do we do?

The Rights Respecting team have weekly meetings with myself to create ideas to promote the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child, which is a document signed by 196 countries to protect the rights of children around the world. Article of the Month, which is shared with review tutors once a month, is just one of the resources created by the team, who have also created teaching resources for the PSHCE curriculum. The ambassadors regularly visit their peers during form time to issue article of the month posters and to remind students of forthcoming events. They have also presented our work through an assembly at the beginning of the year to inform their peers about rights that are denied to many children around the world. Alongside this, we have created resources have been created for the Summer term in order to develop our understanding of the plight of children both in the UK and elsewhere in the world. Ambassadors also devised and planned a fundraising event - a students v staff netball match during the lunch time of the 12th July, which was a great success and with all donations going to UNICEF.

We continue to create ways for our students to be aware of their rights and there will be further opportunities for students to join the team in the Autumn term.

Geography

Last half term, Year 7 students finished the 'Weather and Climate' unit of work. Students began to study the fieldwork enquiry process, conducting their own investigation into microclimates around the school site - when we were eventually able to get outside (due to the rain!) The pupils are now studying specific biomes including rainforests and deserts.

Year 8 have finished the unit of work on 'Extreme Weather' and have researched some interesting case studies. They have now moved on to 'Population'.

Year 9 have just finished studying tectonic hazards, such as earthquakes, volcanoes and tsunamis. They have been looking at how countries are affected by these events and why the effects and responses vary between different countries. They have recently moved on to 'Geographical Skills', practising their map-reading skills.

Year 10 students have had a busy term with two field trips! In May, we visited Carding Mill Valley, where students used a variety of equipment to measure the changes to the river as it flows downstream. In June, we visited Stratford upon Avon to complete human geography fieldwork and investigate the impact of tourism on the town centre. Year 12 have recently completed their first A-Level mock examination and have made good progress with choosing their coursework topics. They are looking forward to starting their data collection over the summer!

Finally, well done to our Year 11 and Year 13 students who have worked hard all year and have now finished their geography exams!

We are pleased students had such a positive experience and many have returned to school feeling inspired for their next steps in education.






Science

Art

Open City Workshop Tuesday 11th of June

On Tuesday 11th June, art students participated in an Open City Workshop on the built environment. We were provided with a choice of three animals and three types of buildings. A duck, a giraffe and a bear and a house, a bridge and a transport stop. We had to consider the basic needs of the animal/client and created it for them out of paper, straws, glue, pens and masking tape. We all learnt a lot about the architectural process and we really enjoyed the session.

Sakinah Pallaud Y10 student: "In the workshop we first talked about architecture, how there are many jobs in building and constructing areas and what they have to think about to make a successful project. Then we randomly chose an animal (options were bear, giraffe and a duck) and randomly picked a structure (options were house, bridge and a transport stop). We had to accustom the structure of choice to be suitable for the animal. We built this with card and straws. When the time limit went off, we picked an animal of our choice and renovated the structure to suit that animal too. We did these fun activities to test how we would structure the building well and what we would do if it needed to change it. The most interesting part was when we had the new animal and we had to redo some parts of our structure. I made at first a train station with my group but then we had birds as our new animal. I made a lot of vines so that the birds could eat berries and the giraffe could eat the leaves."

We were joined by a team from the Ministry of Building an Innovation Education on the 8th of July.

Alevel business students and the Eco Committee were tasked with shaping our future housing and protecting our planet. The workshop was lead by Mark from MOBIE who helped stimulate students to think creatively, decision making about home and environmental issues and inspiring great home designs that can help reduce our environmental impact.

Sociology and Politics

This term, year 12 and 13 Politics students were given the opportunity to take part in the Model United Nations event at the King Edward VI school. This involved the students performing the diplomatic process that takes place during United Nations summits. We had two countries represented; Cuba and Greece. The event saw schools from across Birmingham attend the 2024 event. The students debated issues around the

Israeli-Palestine conflict, transgender rights and cryptocurrencies, whilst representing the views of their country. Students were given the opportunity to work in committees where they attempted to agree to resolutions on these controversial issues. The event culminated in a general assembly, where students gave speeches in support and against resolutions put forward to delegates from all countries. In addition, there were a number of guest speakers. This included Dr Julian Pänke, a politics professor at the University of Birmingham, and the Chief Master, Dr Katy Ricks. The students really appreciated the opportunity to develop their communication skills and understanding of diplomatic relations in global politics.

Yr 12 Work Experience 1 - 5 July

90% of the Year 12 went on a practical work experience placement for one week in July. The small number of students left in school helped with our Year 11 taster day, supported various 'departments in school, worked with our Independent Careers Advisor Mrs Johal on careers related learning and attended Aston University Open Day



I had the absolute best time whilst on work experience as I got a taste for what a healthy work environment looks like. I enjoyed learning about the day to day roles of a Pharmacist and seeing what a normal day looks like. I enjoyed every minute of work experience and cannot wait to return over summer to gain many more valuable skills. Karina

Within my work experience I was able to invoke the world of law as I am quite passionate about pursuing a job in law and my work experience was based in Nicholls Brimble Bhol (NBB Law) solicitors firm. Here I was able to experience different departments and learn different departments' roles and what they do as a department. During this I was given a real time case and had to find out which party was guilty and what is the after effect when a party is found guilty. I was surrounded by good and positive people that showed the reality of being a solicitor and the hard work, and the blood sweat and tears they put into their work to get the best outcome for their clients. I was also lucky to be able to watch contracts being signed as well as clients having conversations with the solicitors and being able to write notes down on how a client and solicitor should have a relationship and as well as being able to see the behind-the-scenes. I was able to see the department of education, law, conveyancing, family law, and Will's, probates and lasting power of attorney. This gave me a great insight on how the environment is and how stressful it can be and the reality of being in the field of law. I was also able to experience the admin side of being in the office where this is the first stage on how different paperwork is sent to different types of departments. I personally enjoyed family law because I found it very interesting and the mentor who was teaching me and supporting me was very lovely in the way that she enabled me to talk to clients and help her which I really enjoyed as well as I enjoyed education law because it helped me to see that many students who feel a bit unjust within school and they feel the school isn't doing enough situation I feel that it was very strong in the sense that it spoke for students. I personally feel that this work experience really helped me confirming that I do want to have a career in the legal aspect as well as knowing that some solicitors have been a solicitor for more than a decade and having different experiences in different departments really did help me as I was able to talk and tell them on the field I like and for them to help me with the field was really great where I was able to find more information about a specific field with possibly the specific law firm I was at didn't do as the law firm I worked at was a civil firm rather than a criminal firm again gave me aspect to the different types of law, which I personally didn't know about till I experienced it. I also feel having a good work environment is essential as you're able to have a bit of joke but as well as get the job done which I was shown during my work experience at NBB, I was also able to overview a bundle of a case and listen to a hearing which really showed me how one should speak during this and the information which is reliable and important to the information that isn't. During the last month we have had 32 Year 9 and 39 Year 10 students take part in their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Qualifying Expedition. This consisted of a two day expedition in Kinver and the surrounding area where students walked approximate 13 km on each day carrying everything that they needed to be self sufficent over the two days as well as pitching and sleeping their tents and preparing and cooking the meals throughout the expedition. The Year 10 expedition earlier this week had slightly worse weather (also known as more rain) then the Year 9 expedition earlier this month however the students were resilent and dealt with this and the other hurdles they came across, whether it was getting lost and getting back on track, animals within the fields or sleeping in a tent.

The Scholars Programme – Brilliant Club
