As we approach the end of the Autumn term, I would like to say a massive thank you to the whole school community for making Lordswood such a great school.

You will be aware that this term we have had a massive focus on character education, with a specific focus on the 'civic virtue'. Thirty-six Year 8 students took part in the Faraday Challenge. This is a full-day activity focusing on science and engineering. This year's theme was batteries. They applied all the skills they have been developing so far at LGS in their science, maths, and computing lessons in order to overcome the obstacles. Business Studies

Year 11 Visit Birmingham's Merlin Attractions to Investigate Pricing and Product Placement **Techniques**

With major attractions in Birmingham being part of the Merlin Group, the business team took Year 11 to the Sea Life Centre and the LEGOLAND Discovery Centre to learn more about market segmentation, product placement, and pricing strategies. They were then escorted to the Bullring Shopping Centre, where they had time to examine the product ranges of LEGO in Selfridges and the LEGO Store, comparing them with what they had seen at the two attractions.

It was fantastic to see an ex-student from last year's Year 13 cohort working at the LEGO counter in Selfridges. They informed us that prices aren't prominently displayed on LEGO goods; instead, price tags are located beneath the products, encouraging customers to pick them up, engage with them, or even purchase them without thinking too much about the price!



Trip Feedback

Our visit to Birmingham's Merlin Attractions was both an educational and enjoyable experience for me and my peers. It provided us with the opportunity to see first-hand how businesses operate and how the pricing strategies we are taught in the classroom come to life.

This was particularly evident in the LEGO Store and Selfridges (in the Bullring), as they offered the same products but at different prices. This discrepancy made me wonder, and I later realised that it wasn't just about the goods or services they sell. In reality, factors such as branding, packaging, and aesthetics-not only of the products but also of the shops themselves-play a crucial role in making them more appealing. These qualities hold significant power, giving businesses a competitive advantage that leads to success.

We also had the chance to visit the Sea Life Centre, where we made a fascinating observation: both the LEGOLAND Discovery Centre and the Sea Life Centre featured numerous LEGO figurines. This highlighted how businesses within the same organisation collaborate to promote awareness of one another, which I found intriguing.

Overall, this trip was an excellent experience, as it gave me a deeper understanding of how businesses operate, insights into what influences their pricing, and an appreciation of the key factors that provide a competitive edge in the market. Vanessa, Year 11




Design Technology - What's been going on!

Year 7 Dudley Zoo Gift Shop Project

Students have been working hard conducting research to enable them to produce design ideas. Students will then go on to produce their products for the gift shop in the new year. Research has involved producing an inspiration board, a textiles sample demonstrating crossstitch, fabric pens, sewing a simple felt shape and a bead onto fabric and research into timbers and fabrics.





Year 8 & <u>9 Wearable</u> Accessory

Students have been conducting research into design movements and plastics. They have chosen a design movement to inspire the design of a wearable accessory. The best ones will then be exhibited in the summer term in conjunction with the art department.

Year 10 students have been studying the unit 1 element of the course which looks at the hospitality and catering industry, job roles and different types of food establishments such as buffets and silver service. Alongside this students have been developing their food practical skills by making a range of chicken dishes. For example chicken wing salad, chicken pie and chicken cordon bleu!







Year 10 have chocolatey fun at Cadbury World

As the business studies team launched the market unit of the GCSE specification the students embarked on a visit to Cadbury World where they engaged in a talk about Mondelez as Cadbury's parent company; supporting their previous learning on business ownership and growth. The attraction also supported students to understand seasonal products, pricing ranges and promotion techniques used by the UK's leading chocolate producers who contributed towards Mondelez £680 million revenue last year.

Educating Others

The Eco Committee has made significant contributions to raising awareness about sustainability. Praise for Environmentally Conscious Students

A new initiative has encouraged students to take responsibility for their classroom environment by closing windows, turning off lights, and disposing of waste at the end of Period 5. This effort not only fosters environmental responsibility but also enables students to earn praise points for respecting the environment.

By reducing waste, conserving energy, and promoting sustainable habits, students are making a tangible positive impact. Additionally, the energy savings benefit the school by reducing costs, allowing funds to be redirected towards education. Cleaning classrooms of waste also decreases health risks associated with litter and pollution, resulting in a cleaner, healthier environment.

This initiative has helped students develop habits that contribute to a more eco-sustainable future. Between September and December, students collectively earned 330 praise points for their efforts to protect the environment.

Sociology and Politics

This term a group of year 13 politics and sociology students visited the Houses of Parliament and Supreme Court in London. The trip involved attending a guided tour and talk about the role of the Supreme Court, supplementing the study of the Supreme Court as part of the A Level Politics course. We then went to the Houses of Parliament where we took part in a tour and question and answer session with Lord Hunt of Kings Heath and MP Preet Gill. The students asked some probing questions on issues such as the new Renter's Rights Bill and levels of inequality in Birmingham. The trip also gave the student the chance to attend a session of the House of Lords. The students who attended found this very engaging, and a very useful opportunity to apply their knowledge and understanding from the classroom to the real-life examples within parliament.

In addition, we took the year 13 sociology students to visit the newly established West Midlands Police Museum. The museum is on the site of a Victorian cell block. The students attended a talk on crime in Birmingham and were given a tour of the former prison. The students were able to make links to their current lessons on crime and punishment. After the tour, we visited Birmingham Crown Court where students were given the opportunity to observe cases taking place.

Year 12 A-Level Students Investigate 'Inferior' and 'Normal' Products

Year 12 A-level students conducted a taste test to explore the concepts of 'inferior' and 'normal' products. Alongside tasting, they analysed the design, texture, smell, and quality of competing items. This activity supported their learning of product design and price elasticity of demand. Once students identified which products were classified as inferior or normal, they were surprised by the influence of price and packaging.

Year 12 Business Students Explore the Hustle and Bustle of Birmingham's Christmas Markets Year 12 Business students visited Birmingham's Christmas markets to investigate the product range, diverse staffing, and pricing strategies on display. They were set a challenge to answer 12 bespoke questions about the markets and analyse why they have been such a success for the past 27 years. As the largest market of its kind outside Germany and Austria, Birmingham's Christmas market provided valuable insights for the students. It supported their studies by offering a real-world example of where buyers meet sellers and showcasing the significant impact these markets have on local trade in the city centre.

On the 15th of November the year 12 and 13 art and photography students went to the city centre to photograph the architecture, visit the Ikon and Birmingham Art and Museum Gallery to explore different styles and periods of art. The art students created live drawing observations of architectural details around Birmingham whilst the photography students captured this theme through their cameras.

Students have then used the imagery they created on the trip to make new artistic imagery in their lessons.
