The year 8's were devising for the first time a piece of theatre for themselves based upon the 1947 partition of India. This time period was chosen to learn about historical and social plays. It was a piece they could create using all the techniques they have learnt so far. It was a first for them all but they all remembered putting on plays when they were little and this helped them create the story. Many of the girls shared their families' heritage stories of growing up in England or coming to England and used these to help them devise their plays.

Year 9 - Circles - a play based on the number 11 Bus route.

The girls worked on duets about two characters who live in Birmingham and catch the number 11 Bus. This work allowed all the girls to direct and act in a naturalist piece of theatre for themselves. This was a culmination from everything they have learnt over the three years into a mini performance to share and show off their technique and skills.

This term we enjoyed working on forum theatre otherwise known as in the round. We worked on a play called Hood about a girl, Hood, who has to take responsibility for her family. What a busy 2nd year we have had in the design & technology department!! Here's a quick breakdown of some of the fantastic things students have been designing and making this term.

Yr7

Students this term have been busy preparing and cooking a range of dishes which would be suitable to be sold at the Queen Mary restaurant located at Dudley Zoo. The dishes have been created to either be eaten inside the restaurant or be eaten as a picnic food. Dishes have included cookies, scones, pizza, stir fry and couscous salad. The results have been amazing!

Yr8 & 9

Students have been busy focusing on improving their sewing skills by making lip balm holders and then going on to make either a tote bag or tool roll. By making these items students have been developing their fabric cutting skills, pinning skills, use of the sewing machine and ironing skills.

Yr10 students have been studying the unit 2 element of the course which looks at deciding on suitable nutritional dishes for a toddler and parent. Students have to plan their meals in detail, prepare, cook and plate them and evaluate the final result.

End of year design and technology exhibition

Last half term, Year 7 students finished the 'Weather and Climate' unit of work. Students began to study the fieldwork enquiry process, conducting their own investigation into microclimates around the school site - when we were eventually able to get outside due to the rain! The pupils are now studying specific biomes including rainforests and deserts.


Year 8 explored Extreme Weather through fascinating case studies and are now shifting focus to the topic of Population.

Year 9 have just finished studying tectonic hazards, such as earthquakes, volcanoes and tsunamis. They've explored how impacts differ across countries and are now developing their map-reading skills in Geographical Skills.

Year 10 students have had a busy term with two field trips! In May, they visited Carding Mill Valley to measure the changes to the river as it flows downstream. In July, they visited Stratford upon Avon to investigate the impact of tourism on the town centre.



Year 12 ventured to Warley Woods to measure carbon storage in our local woodland. Now they're preparing for independent coursework over the summer!

Well done to all students who've taken part in clubs, teams, or performances this year—you've made it a fantastic year for PE!




Sports Day 2025 - A Brilliant Day of Fun, Competition and Team Spirit!














Year 12 Post 18 Preparation Day

Students were then given an hour to get started on their UCAS applications. The day was rounded off with a presentation by Mrs Leadbetter, Director of Post 16 Studies, to parents, with lots of tips on how to support their child through the Post 18 process.

UCAS Exhibition

Year 12 Work Experience Week: A Brilliant Success! 30th June – 4th July 2025

We are incredibly proud of our Year 12 students who took part in this year's Work Experience Week, a fantastic opportunity for them to explore future careers, build essential skills, and gain real insight into the world of work.

An impressive 75% of the year group secured practical placements in a wide range of settings, including law firms, hospitals, pharmacies, primary schools, nurseries, charity shops, and many more. The feedback from employers has been overwhelmingly positive, with several commenting on the maturity, enthusiasm, and professionalism of our students. Some students made such a strong impression that they were offered part-time roles, a brilliant testament to their hard work and attitude.

For those students who remained in school, the week was equally valuable. They worked closely with our independent Careers Adviser, Mrs Johal, receiving expert guidance on UCAS applications and personal statements, a key step in preparing for their next chapter. In addition, they experienced the demands of real work by contributing behind the scenes to school life: painting scenery for the upcoming production of Matilda, helping to clean and organise areas in PE and Food Technology, and offering outstanding support during school events throughout the week.

Gaby spent her week looking after animals at Top Barn Farm Shop and shared the following: "My work experience was very rewarding, as I got to learn many new skills both socially and with animals. I am really grateful for the opportunity the school gave us to do this, as it is so helpful for my application to vet school. I will, I hope, increase my chances of being accepted into my dream university."

Rayaan and Parwana tell us all about their experiences:

I recently volunteered at Queen Alexandra College (QAC) for two days, supporting blind and visually impaired individuals, and it was an incredibly rewarding experience. During my time there, I had the opportunity to guide visual impairment individuals around the exhibition. I made sure to approach people with patience, empathy, and a willingness to help. It was important to me to create a comfortable and supportive environment for the individuals I was working with, and I did my best to be both helpful and respectful in every interaction. Even though it was just two days, I felt that I was able to make a positive impact. I learned a lot about different ways to support people with visual impairments. More importantly, I connected with some amazing individuals and walked away from the experience feeling inspired and grateful for the opportunity. Volunteering at QAC really strengthened my passion for helping others, and I'd definitely love to be involved in doing something like this again and will also help me to boost my personal statement for University.

Volunteering at QAC was a wonderful experience, I met lots of friendly people, and we had great conversations about life. I learned how blind people cope with daily challenges and the struggles they face, which was very eye-opening. It felt really good to help others, and I also learnt many things at the event.
